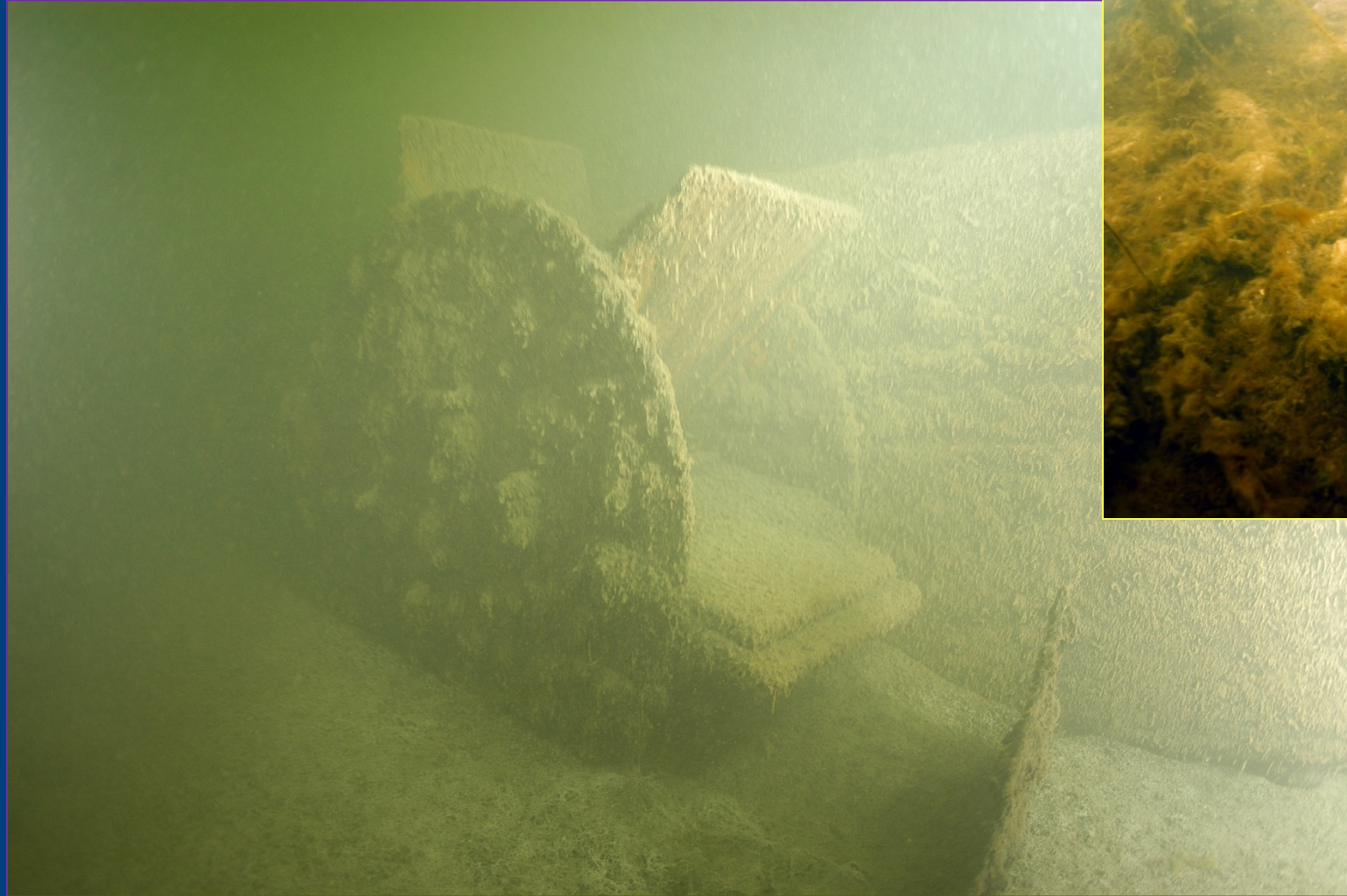

The Law: § 106 of the National Historic Preservation Act

Directs Federal Agencies:

- 1) to identify sites eligible for listing on the National Register of Historic Places.
- 2) to consider effects on sites eligible for listing on the National Register of Historic Places.
- 3) to consult with the WHS and other parties to address Adverse Effects to such sites.

ACOE -- § 106 Project

The Law: Wis. Stats. § 44.40

- **State Agencies must consider effects on sites recorded in the Wisconsin Inventory of Historic Places.**
- **WHS reviews all State Agency projects that may affect such sites.**

The Law: Wis. Stats. §§ 44.42 and 66.1111

- **Local Units of Government must consider effects on sites listed in the State Register or National Register of Historic Places.**
- **WHS reviews all Local Unit of Government projects that may affect such sites.**

The Law: Wis. Stats 157.70

- Protects All burial sites in Wisconsin, regardless of age or cultural affiliation.



Lower Mud Lake Archaeological Complex

- **Skare Site**

- Only intact Early PI settlement known in Wisconsin
- Also occupied during a crucial ‘gap’ in Late Woodland history

- **Dreyson Fish Weir**

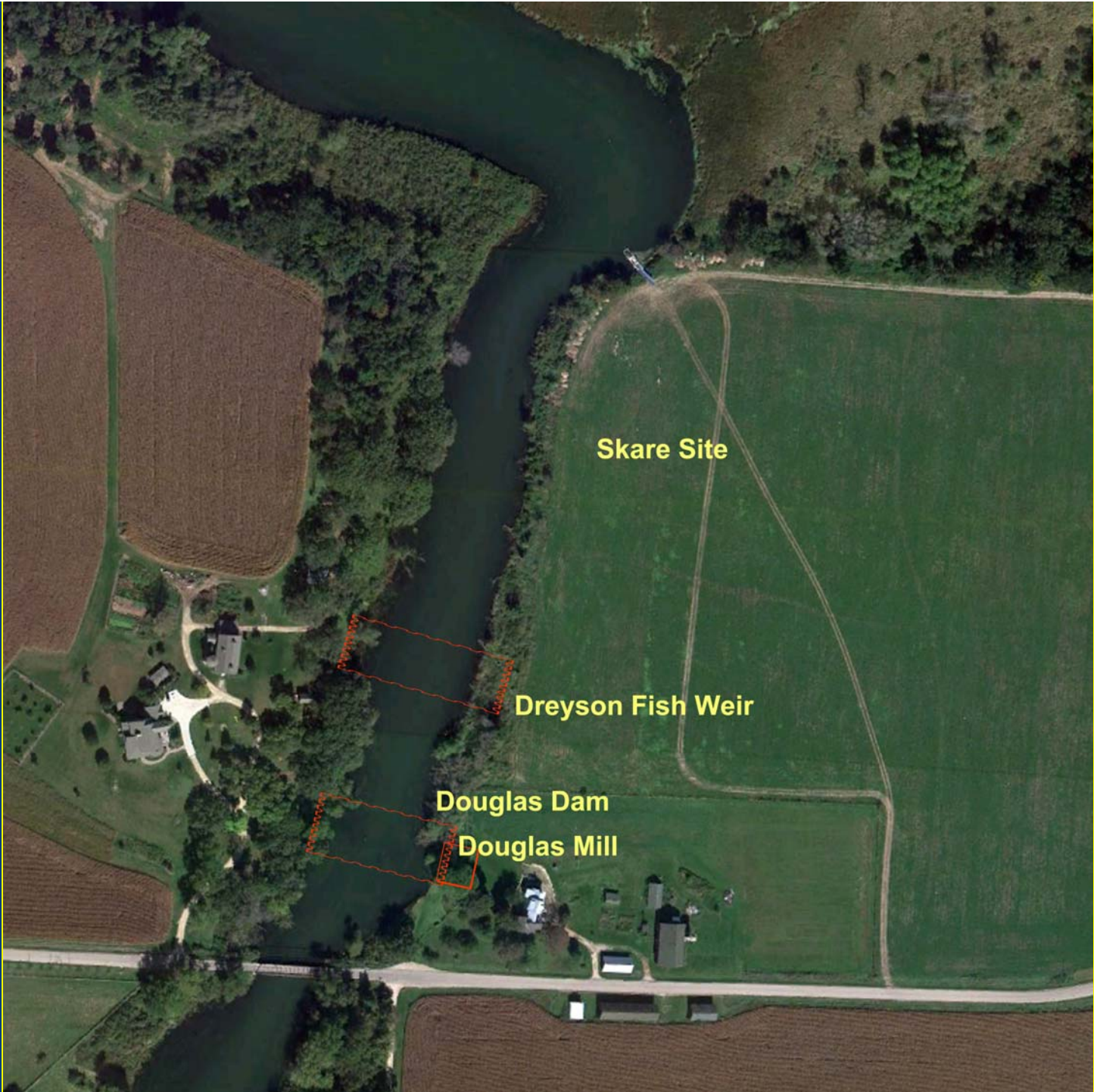
- Built prior to 1840, used as late as early 20th century
- One of only a dozen preserved in the state

- **Douglas Dam and Sawmill**

- Built 1840-1860 by first settler in Township
- Only known intact mid 19th century dam in Wisconsin

- **Listed on NRHP in 2004**
